Statement of Karen Kerrigan, President of the **Small Business Survival Committee** (SBSC) regarding "opening day" of signing onto Global **Climate** Treaty:

"Today is the first day the Kyoto Protocol -- the U.N. Global **Climate** Treaty -- is open for signature by countries which agreed to become party to its binding reductions in energy use. The Administration, which 'negotiated' this misguided effort at the bequest of left-wing lobbies and our international competitors, must not sign this agreement despite its promise to do so 'at the earliest feasible date.'

"President Clinton should not sign this document for numerous reasons:
-- Despite White House claims that the debate over global warming is in

fact over, an examination of their substantiation of '2,000 scientists' reveals experts in traditional Chinese medicines as well as 'urban studies,' hotel administrators, 'masters of arts,' psychiatrists, gynecologists, landscape architects, anatomists, archaeologists, and it goes on.

"In response to such chimeras, 100 **climate** scientists signed the Leipzig Declaration stating global warming is likely not a genuine phenomenon, and if it is, it certainly is an unproven one. You are more likely to buy a used car from the Administration's experts, if only because they are more likely to be used car salesmen.

-- Developing countries cannot become party to the Kyoto Protocol approved by the Administration. In other words, economic 'weak sisters' such as China, Mexico, South Korea, India, Brazil, and others get to absorb all of the industry and jobs that will be impermissible in the U.S. under this treaty if the Administration signs it.

"The Administration showed its hand two years ago with the statement by

then-negotiator for the U.S., Tim Wirth, who said that, even if it isn't true, isn't it the right thing to do?

"Beginning with that, and working all the way through these deceptions, sacrificing hard-earned economic gains, American jobs, and national sovereignty in the name of some far-left ideology it is not the right thing to do."
